Sarah died in Haverhill and is buried in the Pike New Hampshire cemetery. Franklin died in Hartford Connecticut.

In 1694, the Indians were still troubling the settlers by the raids. On September 4, Joseph Pike, deputy sheriff of Essex, while traveling between Amesbury and Haverhill, fell into an ambuscade of the enemy on the ridge near Gilman Merrill's, and was murdered.¹

On Robert Pike Son of John Pike (I) and brother of John Pike (II). His biographer says of Robert Pike that he was engaged in three conspicuous controversies during his life. The first was his arraignment by the general court in 1653, for his hostility to the persecution of the Quakers. The second was his resistance to the dogmatic authority of the clergy, in the person of his paster Rev. John Wheelwright. The third was his bitter opposition to the witchcraft prosecutions in 1692. In all of these controversies, Mr. Pike stood practically alone. He was a century in advance of his time, and a century more than vindicated his advanced positions. The historian of the Salem witchcraft delusion says that "not a voice comes down to us of deliberate and effective hostility to the movement, except that of Robert Pike.²
